What is Future Gardeners?

Future Gardeners aims to provide horticultural training to people who are long-term unemployed or who have face challenges in their lives and would benefit from gaining confidence, skills and the opportunity of training and employment.

Developed by prominent organisations in the industry, including Bankside Open Spaces Trust (BOST), The Worshipful Company of Gardeners, The Royal Parks Guild and Walworth Garden, Future Gardeners is run by BOST working in partnership with numerous other organisations to ensure its success.

Participants are given the opportunity to gain the skills they need to be work-ready and get an entry level horticultural job or go onto further training in the

industry.

Although Future Gardeners is suited to a wide variety of people, it targets those with the most need, such as people not in education or training, the long-term unemployed, those who cannot afford other horticultural courses, and people with learning needs or disabilities.

The course is practically focused, and includes the following:

- A City and Guilds qualification in Practical Horticulture Level 2 at Walworth Garden.
- Practical experience in BOST community parks and gardens.
- Work experience with horticultural industry leaders including Royal Parks Greenwich, Chelsea Physic Garden, Crown Estates Paving Commission, Kew Gardens, Frognal Gardens, Maylim and Willerby Landscapes.
- Research visits and workdays with outside organisations in the horticultural sector: Chiswick House and Gardens, the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) Garden Wisley, Kew Gardens, National Trust's Morden Hall, Fulham Palace House & Garden and Hampton Court Palace and Gardens.
- Horticultural industry expert talks to inspire students about their future careers.
- CV building, help with applying for jobs and interview techniques to ensure students are work-ready once they complete the course.
- One-to-one individually tailored mentoring and support aimed at building confidence

The need for Future **Gardeners**

The shortage of skilled professionals entering the horticultural industry in the UK has now been deemed 'critical' by the Royal Horticultural Society.

This is due to three factors:

- the current ageing workforce,
- lack of apprentices going into the industry at entry level,
- and difficulties in recruiting for skilled vacancies.

(The 2019 Horticulture Sector Skills Survey undertaken by Pye Tait for the Ornamental Horticultural Roundtable Group (OHRG)).

With the OHRG predicting that the skills shortage will seriously restrict future business growth and with horticulture contributing over £9 billion to the UK economy each year, there are sound economic reasons to address this skills shortage.

Unemployment can affect mental health, confidence and self-esteem as well as lead to debt and poor physical health. A 2017 study by the UCL Centre for Longitudinal Studies showed that if you are young and unemployed, you are more than twice as likely to have mental health needs.

At the same time, there is a need for horticulture to be presented as an accessible (no barriers to entry), fulfilling career choice to many who may not have thought of it as being an option for them, especially those who have limited or no qualifications and who would prefer to have a career outdoors.

Future Gardeners is designed to give people the skills and knowledge they need to explore the horticultural industry with confidence.

Employment mentoring

Future Gardeners Project Manager Louisa Mansfield supported students with careers advice and employability skills. The aim is that all students have an up-to-date gardening CV and are confident in both applying for jobs and attending interviews by the end of the course.

The students were helped in their employment journey with a mixture of presentations, workshops and a weekly 'Job Club'. Held outside of course days, the club offers 1-2-1 help with whatever the students need in their job search. In the post-course survey carried out, 100% of respondents who had attended lob Club said it was useful for updating their CV.

All students were also introduced to Fresh Horticultural Careers - a specialist recruitment agency for the garden maintenance, landscaping and horticulture industries throughout the UK - and were assisted in registering for both permanent and temporary jobs.

2023 Royal Parks Guild Discovery Day

We were so pleased our Future Gardeners students were invited to the Royal Parks Guild Discovery Day in 2023, hosted by Historic Royal Palaces at Hampton Court.

There were lots of interactive moments during the day. Everyone was asked to discuss 80 (Al generated) roles associated with horticulture and park management, as well as the idea of a 'National Nature Service'. This idea would offer every child leaving school an opportunity to work in a nature related role for a year.

A panel discussion was held chaired by Ruth Lin Wong Holmes (Vice Chair of the Guild) with Emma McNamara (National Trust), Jane Pelly (Royal Parks), Billy Knowles (Director of YES, supporting New to Nature for the National Lottery Heritage Fund) and Tom Young (Nuffield Scholar for the Worshipful Company of Gardeners).

It was a lively discussion about tackling the climate change emergency, equity, equality, diversity, inclusion and justice alongside caring for historic landscapes.

Back in the Garden Room the final part of the day included thanks to everyone, a special message from Chris Packham (organised by Richard Pollard of the Tree Council) and a song by the Tree Council Ambassador, Benjamin Haycock who took to the stage and pounded out his 'Singing Force for Nature' anthem.

Work Experience Charter

Meaningful work experience is a key component of Future Gardeners and is fundamental to supporting our students into long-term careers in the industry. Understanding this, we have created the Future Gardeners Work Placement Charter that sets a benchmark for purposeful and supportive work experience opportunities in the horticultural industry.

We already have several organisations as signatories including Kew Gardens, Royal Historical Palaces (Hampton Court and Kensington Palace), Grosvenor Estates, Frognal Gardens, Chelsea Physic Gardens and Provender Nurseries.



Championing Horticultural Careers

In early 2024, the Future Gardeners project team submitted written evidence to the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs Committee's inquiry into Education and Careers in land-based sectors. The committee sees MPs look at career pathways into the sectors, which cover outdoor jobs like farming and horticulture, how the sector can attract and retain workers, and what its future workforce might look like.

Bankside Open Spaces Trust submitted written evidence to the committee from Louisa Mansfield and Shereen Chung-Blake. Our evidence focused on the value of environmental horticulture, its benefits to the economy, and proven track record of tackling inequalities in employment for minority groups and those with disabilities. We asked that environmental horticulture be included in the government's green jobs and skills definitions and that the value of this sector is recognised.



Future Gardeners at Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park

In May 2023, we launched a pilot project of Future Gardeners at the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park (QEOP). This programme was open to applicants from the neighbouring boroughs and is, as ever, designed to enable people to gain the core skills they need to access entry level jobs in the horticulture industry.

The course was run by Bankside Open Spaces Trust in partnership with the London Legacy Development Corporation, The Skills Centre and idverde.



The course consisted of visits to Victoria Park, West Ham Park, The Tree Musketeers and the Sky Garden and studying for a City and Guilds L1 Award with idverde. There were employability workshops and talks from those already in the industry along with a two week work experience placement with idverde in QEOP.

Success of the course

During the 2023-2024 year, 43 students enrolled and 40 completed the course, a completion rate of 93%.

73% of those who have completed the course have now gone into employment or further training in the industry.

Employers include Frognal Gardens, Willerby Landscapes, Bankside Open Spaces Trust, Clarion Housing, Chelsea Physic Garden, Fulham Palace Garden and Kew Gardens.

In our eighth year:



53% of students were from global majority background.



47% were white British or other white background.



63% of students had a disability or long-term health condition, 37% had no disability.



58% of Future Gardeners students were female, 42% male.
